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# AN IMPRESSIVE PAIR OF EDWARDIAN CARVED PORTLAND STONE COLUMNS

removed from Eton College, carved for the School Hall c.1905-8 by Abraham Broadbent (1868-1919) to designs by Laurence K Hall, RESERVED

each with a Roman Ionic order capital, with spirally carved volutes, raised on a cylindrical stem with entasis and a torus moulded foot and square foot-block,

DIMENSIONS: 316cm (124 $\frac{1}{2}$ " ) High, 59cm (23 $\frac{3}{4}$ " ) Wide, 59cm (23 $\frac{3}{4}$ " ) Deep, the height given includes a few cm that would have been sub-soil, installed height from pavement surface =305cm (10')

## HISTORY

The design of Eton's fabulous School Hall (built 1905-8) was awarded to a former Etonian – architect Laurence Hall – the decision being overseen by Norman Shaw. The Hall, together with a new library, formed a complex of buildings at the heart of the school *in memoriam* to the 129 Etonians who fell in the second Boer War (1899-1902). It was opened in November 1908 by Edward VII.
