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
EXCEPTIONAL 'NEW IRON AGE' HAND WROUGHT FIRE GRATE,

HISTORY

Take from the website of the Victorian & Albert Museum - 'Antony Robinson was one of the first

artist-blacksmiths and a key part of the 'Renaissance' in blacksmithing in England in the 1970s and 1980s, represented at the exhibition 'Towards a new iron age', held at the V&A in 1982...Robinson was one of the first British blacksmiths to experiment with new forms in iron. He designed and forged the pair of stainless steel gates for the medieval Great Hall in Winchester, Hampshire, 1981-3'
